HEAR FOR YOU

We know what it's really like

All our lives, we have dealt with misconceptions and misinformation surrounding deafness/hearing loss.

We are in a position to offer advice and empower our teenagers on how to best deal with it.

Why was Hear For You started?

90% + of deaf/hard of hearing teenagers:

- Come from hearing families,
- Learn to speak and hear with devices,
- Have hearing friends
- Go to mainstream schools & engage in mainstream activities

HOWEVER,

- May be only one in their school with a hearing loss
- Not met another deaf person since El years
- Unsure if they are 'deaf' or not
- In the 'support bubble'
- No specific community of their own



What is our message?

We may be adults and we may have been through it before but...



We offer advice

We are not here to tell them what they have/must/need to do as a deaf/hard of hearing person



This is your place

We want them to feel comfortable sharing experiences



Thrive, not survive

We want them to start thriving, instead of just surviving



Your life, your journey

We want them to take control!

Essentially, life lessons are important and they need to learn them earlier than their hearing peers because of their deafness/hearing loss!

So where is Hear For You best placed to deliver value?




Spanner in the works!
