Connie Mayer is a Professor in the Faculty of Education at York University and Academic Co-ordinator of the Teacher Preparation Program in the Education of Deaf and Hard of Hearing (DHH) students. Before this, Connie worked as a teacher of the deaf for more than twenty years in a range of communication settings and her special interests are in language and literacy, CI in children, communication approaches and teacher education. She is currently working on research on literacy outcomes in deaf children, and is leading CIICA's research into adult services after CI.

Sue is Coordinator of CIICA and has a background as a teacher of the deaf and managed Nottingham CI programme from its inception for 15 years. Currently, her research focuses on improving accessibility, continuity, and integrality of care for cochlear implant users, expanding best practices to include both in-person and remote care.

Brian Lamb is Public Policy advisor for CIICA and will address the issue of how we can find ways to fund access to CI and the essential support services that should follow. He has worked not just on funding models for access to CI but also thinks the focus of health funding should also be on support and rehabilitation for CI users if they are to make the best of their implants. He also advocates that we should talk more about CI funding as an investment and stop thinking of it as a cost.
