Why this matters to me...




Being a CI-parent and publishing books for families with (and without) hearing loss has taught me many things...

- As parents facing an unexpected, uncertain future for our children, we feel stronger knowing we're not alone.
- We learn and take courage from each other's experiences.

But instead of telling personal stories about individual children, **focus on advocacy** – how are parents changing the landscape for their children in their respective countries?

- Advance awareness and inspire advocacy;
- Highlight challenges and successes in increasing access to CI and services.

Not to create unrealistic expectations or false hope, but to start advocacy efforts at the point where each respective country currently is...

How you can help:

- If you are the parent of a CI-child, write your own advocacy story.
- Collate stories from other parents who are strong advocates in your country.
- Translate the stories into English for the CIICA website.

Please think about the following questions as a guide:

- What was your biggest challenge?
- What has been your greatest support/help?
- What was your greatest achievement?
- What advice would you give another parent?
- How did you make change happen?
